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FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

To the Resident of Scott Township:

This issue of Scott Topics is filled with upcoming events and information that is useful for every resident.

We have many exciting things happening in our community this year.

On Thursday, June 6th I invited the public to meet me for coffee and casual conversation about the Township in the Manager's meeting room on the second floor of the municipal building.

With the support and advocacy of our State Representative Deasy, we received a \$127,764 grant from the Commonwealth Finance Agency for the Bower Hill Sidewalks and \$150,000 towards the replacement of the Community Center roof via the Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund.

As part of our planning processes for the future of Scott Township, we requested funding for a third-party consultant to assist us with a five-year strategic management plan. We also received \$50,000 from the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) for the funding of that process.

The Township Pool is complete and ready for the 2024 pool season. We also received fund-

ing in 2023 to install a chair lift at the pool building and that has been completed as well.

The Township was again awarded Banner Community status in 2023 through the Allegheny League of Municipalities. Scott Township earned this designation by modeling ourselves as a community committed to sustainable practices, intergovernmental cooperation, sound fiscal management and proactive communications to engage community stakeholders.

This issue of the Scott Township News will focus on upcoming events, usual seasonal issues, as well as provide you with some useful information regarding the most recent legislation of general interest to our Scott Township residents. I hope this issue of the newsletter is both informative and helpful to you.

SCOTT TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT

Serving Scott Township and Rosslyn Farms

MATTHEW PODSIADLY, CHIEF OF POLICE



If you're certain that you have a non-emergency and just need information, call 412.279.6911. Calling this number will connect you to a police officer in your area.

The Scott Township Police Department is currently comprised of 23 sworn officers and three civilian employees. This total includes the Chief of Police, two Captains, four Sergeants, fourteen Patrol Officers, two Detectives, the police secretary and two part-time school crossing guards. In addition to their regular duties, there are also special assignments within the police department. There is an officer assigned permanently to the Chartiers Valley Intermediate School as a School Resource Officer and one officer assigned to a traffic unit to focus on traffic concerns. Additionally, several officers have special assignments in cooperative roles with other departments through SHACOG. One officer is assigned to the CIRT Team, two officers are assigned as an accident reconstructionist, and two officers are assigned to the ceremonial unit. These officers respond when the need for their expertise arises and for required training.

The Chief would also like to remind residents and visitors of several items that cause frequent cause for concern of the police department:

- Lock your vehicles!!! The police department has handled countless reports of unlocked vehicles entered and items stolen. Several vehicles were also stolen in this manner.
- Be cognizant of overnight parking regulations on local streets. Officers will issue citations to those in violation. If a special need arises to park on the street overnight, contact the police department for permission.
- Parking in Glendale- the police department recognizes the challenges of parking in the Glendale neighborhood. When you must park on the sidewalk, only do so partially so as not to obstruct the passage of pedestrians or those using wheelchairs or similar mobility devices. That said, **DO NOT PARK ON THE SIDEWALK AT ALL ON CAROTHERS AVENUE.**
- No dogs are permitted in the Township parks, please leave your furry friends at home.
- New soliciting regulations went into effect in January of 2023 with the adoption of Ordinance #1680-23. We will be compiling a "do not knock" list for residents who wish to not receive soliciting visitors. Check the Township website in the very near future for details on how to add your address.
- A program has been implemented to allow residents to register vehicles for overnight parking, provide information about at-risk residents, request vacation checks of their homes, and for businesses and residents to provide keyholder information for their premises. This can be done through the police website at <https://scott-twp.com/departments/scott-township-police-department/>.
- Last, but certainly not least, **IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING.** The police department is here to serve the community that is near and dear to all our hearts. Our community partners are the residents, business owners, and visitors who make Scott Township the wonderful place that it is. If you see something out of the ordinary, don't hesitate to call. Oftentimes, we find out after the fact that things were seen or heard but never reported, or not reported in a timely manner that could assist in an investigation.



Please leave your furry friends at home.

On September 14, 1971 the Township of Scott passed an Ordinance (#823), prohibiting the walking of dogs or the bringing of dogs into the Township Parks and Parklets.

CODE ENFORCEMENT IS VITAL TO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Did you know that Scott Township administers and enforces Pennsylvania's statewide building code, generally known as the Uniform Construction Code (UCC)? Enforcement of the UCC actually began in April 2004. As of Feb. 14, 2022 the applicable codes are the 2018 International Codes issued by the International Code Council, and the provisions amended by the UCC Review & Advisory Council.

So, what does this mean to you as a home owner wanting to make improvements to your property?????

Building permits are required for all improvements regulated by the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code. Zoning Permits are required for all work regulated by the Scott Township Zoning Ordinance.



Spring cleaning is right around the corner; please keep in mind that it is unlawful to have unsightly debris or junk in your yard or around your property. It is also illegal to have an unregistered or uninspected vehicle(s) on your property. Regularly sweep sidewalk to ensure the safety of pedestrians.

Construction bags or dumpsters can be placed on your property for clean up or a construction project for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. PODS are a convenient way to pack your belongings for storage elsewhere. PODS are also permitted to remain on your property for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. You **cannot** use trailers for storage on your property. Bags, Dumpsters, or PODS are not permitted in any roadway area.



Rental Property Inspections

Under PA Act 21, effective June 1, 2015 owners of all rental properties will be required to install carbon monoxide detectors and obtain a rental inspection.

Rental life safety inspections are required each time a new tenant moves in and an annual Certification is required for all rental property in the Township which includes a fee of \$25.00 per dwelling unit.

WORK THAT REQUIRES A ZONING PERMIT, BUT NO BUILDING PERMIT

- One-story detached accessory structures used as tool and storage sheds, greenhouses, playhouse, detached private garage and similar uses, provided the floor area does not exceed 1000 square feet and they are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Retaining walls 4'-0" or less in height, measured from the lowest level of grade to the top of the wall, unless supporting a surcharge (such as, but not limited to, a slope, driveway, patio or swimming pool) or impounding Class I, II or IIIA liquids.
- Sidewalks, parking pads, patios, and driveways not more than 30 inches above adjacent grade, and not over any basement or story below grade and not part of an accessible route.
- Fences 6 feet or less in height.
- Uncovered decks where the deck floor is 30 inches or less above grade and are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Carports (open on at least three sides and not attached to the dwelling)

Building permits **MUST** be obtained **30 days** prior to the project start date and a completed Scott Township Verification of Tax Payments form **MUST** also be included in the application. Applications are available on the Scott Township website under the Code Enforcement tab. All submittals are required to include the application/building permit fee. Incomplete submittals will not be processed.

WORK THAT DOES NOT REQUIRE A PERMIT

- Window awnings that are attached to a single-family dwelling, two-family dwelling, or Group U occupancy structure, are supported by an exterior wall, and do not project more than 54 inches from the exterior wall.
- Movable cases, counters and partitions that are not over 5 feet 9 inches in height.
- Painting, papering, tiling, carpeting, cabinets, counter-tops and similar finish work.
- Window and door replacement that does not require structural modifications to the wall or framing.
- Prefabricated swimming pools accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling that are less than 24" deep, do not exceed 5,000 gallons and are installed entirely above grade.
- Installation of aluminum or vinyl siding onto an existing residential or an existing commercial building.
- Alterations and repairs to residential buildings which do not make structural changes or changes to means of egress.

Please note that the Allegheny County Health Department's Plumbing Division inspects and permits all new or modified residential and commercial plumbing installations to assure compliance with the Health Department's Plumbing Code. Scott Township requires proof of inspection and compliance prior to issuing any Occupancy Permits for all projects that require plumbing permits.

Garbage Collection Reminder

Please be reminded that garbage containers may be placed at the curb side no earlier than 5:00 pm on Sunday evening and must be removed no later than 9:00 pm on Monday evening. Garbage containers shall be stored in the rear of the property within five (5) feet of the primary structure or garage or an accessory structure, including a shed, to be out of sight when viewed from the front of the lot or street. Garbage containers may be stored in the front of the home. In such cases, garbage containers shall be concealed from view from the front of the lot or street with shrubs, trees or by other appropriate measures.

Parking Pads & Driveways

All parking pads and driveways must have a valid permit and must be constructed using either concrete, asphalt, or an approved hard surface. Scott Township does not permit gravel parking pads, gravel driveways, parking pads parallel with the roadway, or parking in the lawn area.

PEST ALERTS

Outdoor Recommendations:

- Avoid having a bird feeder.
- Keep outdoor grills and cooking areas clean.
- Keep firewood off the ground and as far away from structures as possible.
- Maintain at least a 2-foot space between bushes and shrubs.
- Clean up after your dog daily.
- Avoid keeping compost mounds or debris piles.

Indoor Recommendations:

- Opt for garbage bins and compost containers with a top that seals tightly.
- Do not leave pet food or water out overnight.
- Repair leaky pipes.
- Maintain attic, crawl spaces, and cabinets.

We are celebrating 100 years of service to Scott Township this year. Bower Hill is one of the 3 Fire Departments (Glendale and East Carnegie are the other departments serving Scott Township) that serve the over 17,000 Scott Township Residents and Businesses.

Bower Hill is a volunteer fire department with approximately 40 members who responded to 176 calls in 2023 for assistance from the residents and businesses, regardless of the time of day. In addition to these responses members individually participated in approximately 36 hours of additional in-house training totaling over 1,400 hours with many taking additional outside training classes to better train us to help you the residents and businesses of Scott Township and neighboring communities.



Many of our members are part of firefighting families with some of them being 4th or 5th generation firefighters. Our members have gone on to make the fire service a career in many parts of the country such as Maryland, Tennessee, Virginia, Washington D. C., while others stay "closer to home" such as the City of Pittsburgh, Dormont, and North Huntingdon. If you or a family member might be interested in joining us, stop by on any 2nd thru 4th Wednesday of each month to see what we do during training.

Not interested in "fighting Fires" we have several categories of members these are:

REGULAR - anyone 18 and over interested in firefighting or fire ground support services

JUNIOR - (AGES 14-17) interested in firefighting (Some can get this training in high school programs)

FRIEND - Not into firefighting but still want to help, this is the category for you. You can help with fund raising and public service events.

FIREVEST is a program offering firefighters an opportunity to attend CCAC to pursue a degree, not necessarily in the fire Service. The commitment of 5 years to the fire department (including your time attending CCAC) sponsoring you is required. Programs such as Arson Investigation, HVAC, Auto Mechanic and many other courses are available. Some of the FIREVEST graduates have gone on to get a Bachelor's degrees at 4 year colleges and universities.

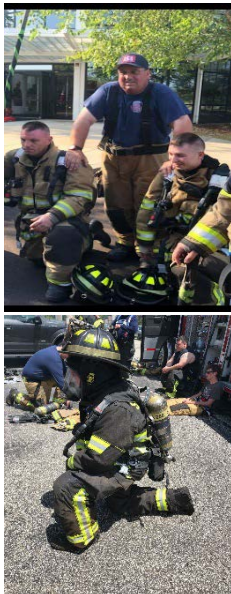

Stormwater Pollution Solutions

Residential



Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.

Lawn care

Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.



- ◆ Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- ◆ Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- ◆ Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- ◆ Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.

Septic systems

Leaking and poorly maintained septic systems release nutrients and pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that can be picked up by stormwater and discharged into nearby waterbodies. Pathogens can cause public health problems and environmental concerns.



- ◆ Inspect your system every 3 years and pump your tank as necessary (every 3 to 5 years).
- ◆ Don't dispose of household hazardous waste in sinks or toilets.

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody.



- ◆ Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- ◆ Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet waste

Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters.



- ◆ When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies.



Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers near storm drains warn residents that pollutants entering the drains will be carried untreated into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement—Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through, decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels—You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquito-proof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.



Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales—Specially designed areas planted with native plants can provide natural places for



rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather than into storm drains.

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets.



Commercial

Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system and eventually enter local waterbodies.

- ◆ Sweep up litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- ◆ Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.
- ◆ Report any chemical spill to the local hazardous waste cleanup team. They'll know the best way to keep spills from harming the environment.

Erosion controls that aren't maintained can cause excessive amounts of sediment and debris to be carried into the stormwater system. Construction vehicles can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater and deposited into local waterbodies.

- ◆ Divert stormwater away from disturbed or exposed areas of the construction site.
- ◆ Install silt fences, vehicle mud removal areas, vegetative cover, and other sediment and erosion controls and properly maintain them, especially after rainstorms.
- ◆ Prevent soil erosion by minimizing disturbed areas during construction projects, and seed and mulch bare areas as soon as possible.

Agriculture

Lack of vegetation on streambanks can lead to erosion. Overgrazed pastures can also contribute excessive amounts of sediment to local waterbodies. Excess fertilizers and pesticides can poison aquatic animals and lead to destructive algae blooms. Livestock in streams can contaminate waterways with bacteria, making them unsafe for human contact.

- ◆ Keep livestock away from streambanks and provide them a water source away from waterbodies.
- ◆ Store and apply manure away from waterbodies and in accordance with a nutrient management plan.
- ◆ Vegetate riparian areas along waterways.
- ◆ Rotate animal grazing to prevent soil erosion in fields.
- ◆ Apply fertilizers and pesticides according to label instructions to save money and minimize pollution.



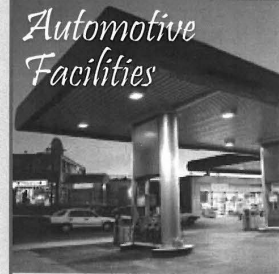
Forestry

Improperly managed logging operations can result in erosion and sedimentation.

- ◆ Conduct preharvest planning to prevent erosion and lower costs.
- ◆ Use logging methods and equipment that minimize soil disturbance.
- ◆ Plan and design skid trails, yard areas, and truck access roads to minimize stream crossings and avoid disturbing the forest floor.
- ◆ Construct stream crossings so that they minimize erosion and physical changes to streams.
- ◆ Expedite revegetation of cleared areas.



Automotive Facilities

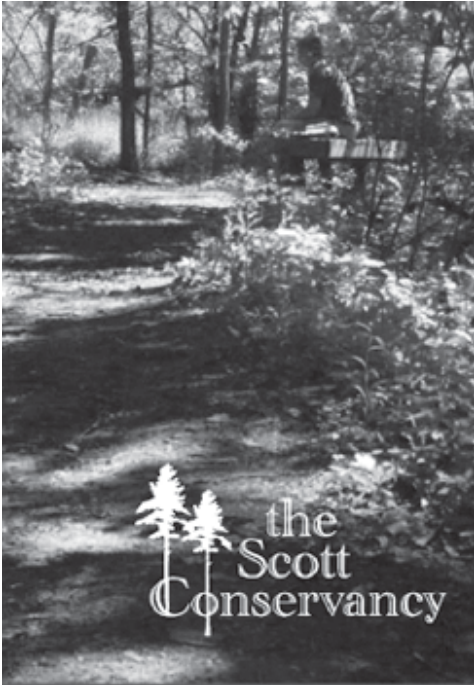


Uncovered fueling stations allow spills to be washed into storm drains. Cars waiting to be repaired can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater.

- ◆ Clean up spills immediately and properly dispose of cleanup materials.
- ◆ Provide cover over fueling stations and design or retrofit facilities for spill containment.
- ◆ Properly maintain fleet vehicles to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into local waterbodies.
- ◆ Install and maintain oil/water separators.

The Scott Conservancy

Offering Woodland Trails and Lovely Natural Venues—Close to Home!

Nestled in the hills of Scott Township is a wonderful, woody escape from the bustle of suburban life. Kane Woods Nature Area on Scrubgrass Road offers a series of intersecting trails in varying levels of difficulty. Relatively level paths crisscross small creeks and pass through scenic forests, while more challenging, steeper paths traverse hillsides. If you choose to visit, you'll likely spy some birds and wildlife, lots of native plants and trees, and other neighborhood folks enjoying the outdoors with their dog. Nearly 80 acres of nature preserve are available for all residents to enjoy. Scott Conservancy members and volunteers maintain the property and keep it attractive and accessible.

Three parking lots are available for visitors: An upper, large lot can be reached via the Whiskey Point Trailhead located at 1501 Main Street, where Main meets Scrubgrass Road, near the Veteran's Memorial Bridge. The most popular parking lot is the Scrubgrass Run Trailhead at 1459 Scrubgrass Road; another option is the Jewish Community Center parking lot on Kane Blvd. All three areas provide easy access to the trail network.

Since Scott Conservancy is managed entirely by volunteers, there is no paid staff; all fundraising is done by members in true grassroots fashion. Money raised by donations is invested back into the properties to improve the nature area and keep trails clear and safe. We maintain an apiary near Providence Point, and sell our local, raw honey as a fundraiser. Additionally, we hold an Annual Ducky Race 50/50 Raffle at Scott Pool on Independence Day, July 4, as our biggest fundraiser of the year. Our most recent annual event, a joint venture with the Scott Township municipal crew, is the collection of your Christmas trees! Fresh cut trees that are dropped off at the Conservancy's Scrubgrass Run trailhead on Scrubgrass Road will be ground into wood chips and spread on our trails, making Kane Woods a more pleasant place to walk all year.

The Scott Conservancy celebrated its 30th anniversary in 2019. The group is comprised of mostly local residents who love Scott Township and its undeveloped natural areas. In addition to Kane Woods, the

Conservancy also maintains part of the traffic island at the intersection of Cochran and Greentree Roads. Scott Conservancy members give their time and efforts in both locations, simply for the benefit of our community. But it's not all work for members and volunteers—we have fun events, like potluck picnics, bonfires, birdwatching hikes, and more! Members receive emails about upcoming events as well as quarterly newsletters with local interest stories. Members also sell honey at local special occasions such as Oktoberfest, Bridgeville Days, and Mt. Lebanon's Earth Day.

We invite you to come see our trails and nature area, and hope you will consider volunteering with the Scott Conservancy or supporting us financially through donations or membership. You can play a role in our mission of preserving Scott Township's green space! 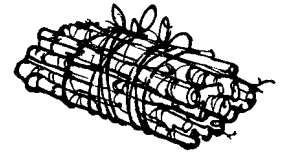
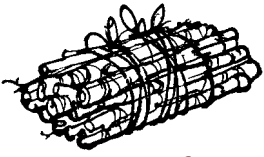

Dear Scott Township Resident:

WM is proud to be your environmental solutions provider. As part of our new contract with Scott Township, all residents will receive automated curbside collection. Beginning January 1, 2024, residents will be limited to material that fits inside of the cart for collection. Material outside of the cart will not be collected. Additional carts can be requested for a fee. The attached calendar shows your recycling and bulk collection service weeks.

WM is excited to continue our partnership with Scott Township and looks forward to helping your community be as green as possible.

General Information

Trash will be collected once every week and recycling will be collected every-other week.

Despite our best efforts, we occasionally miss scheduled collections. If you believe you missed service, visit www.wm.com. Residents can also sign up for a My WM Account to conveniently report missed pickups.

Automated Trash Collection

- Residents must use their 96-gallon carts for automated trash collection. Residents will receive cart limited service beginning January 1, 2024.
- Place your cart at the curb after 6:00 p.m. the night before your scheduled collection or by 6:00 a.m. on your service day.
- Bulk items will be collected once a month during the 1st full week of the month. Please reference the calendar for your 2024 bulk collection dates.
- Make sure there are at least 3 feet between your carts and any obstacles –mailboxes, parked cars or trees.

Automated Recycle Collection

- Residents should continue using their current recycling carts for collection.
- All material must be placed loose in the cart - material should not be bagged.
- Beginning January 1, 2024, all material must fit inside of your provided cart. Material outside of the cart will not be collected.
- Please reference the Recycle Right information for materials that are accepted in your program.



Bulk Items and Overflow Material

WM will only collect material that fits inside your trash and recycling containers. All trash must be bagged and fit inside the provided cart. Recyclables must be placed loose into your recycling cart and boxes must be broken down.

Additional carts can be purchased for an annual fee of \$110 per year, with a 7% increase each year through the contract. To request an additional cart, resident must contact WM at 800-866-4460 and say "Service Change" or visit www.wm.com.

WM will collect 2 bulk items once per month during the 1st full week of the month at no additional charge. Place your bulk items at the curb on the same day as your trash collection during your bulk collection week. **Bulk collection can be scheduled at www.wm.com.**

What is a bulk item?

A bulk item is an appliance, piece of furniture, or some other residential item that is too large for a container. Construction debris and hazardous waste are not permitted as bulk items.

Bulk Waste

- Furniture including chairs, tables, armoires, cabinet, chest, headboard, sofa, mattresses, dressers and interior doors
- Household appliances including washer, dryer, dishwasher, stove, toilet, refrigerator (freon must be removed and must be tagged), microwave, hot water tank, etc.
- Carpeting (must be cut into 4-foot bundles)
- Picnic table or bench (unattached), basketball board or pool (6' or less in height), swing set (unassembled)

Unaccepted Materials

- Concrete, brick, asphalt, roofing, electronics
- Vehicles and parts
- Building materials such as plaster, dry wall, wood, construction debris, etc.

2024 Observed Holidays

Waste Management observes the following holidays.

New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day. When your collection day falls on one of these holidays, or a day that week after the holiday, your service will be delayed one day during that week only. There will be no delays if a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday.

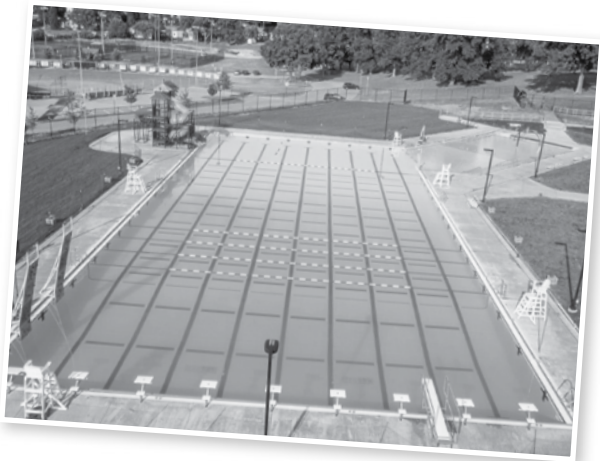
