FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

To the Residents of Scott Township,

This issue of Scott Topics is filled with upcoming events and important information that we believe will be useful to every resident.

We have many exciting developments in our community this year.

With the support of our State Representative, Dan Deasy, we've secured a \$127,764 grant from the Commonwealth Finance Agency for the Bower Hill Sidewalks project, as well as \$150,000 from the Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund for the replacement of the Community Center roof. These projects are set to be underway this year.

As part of our long-term planning for Scott Township's future, we've received funding for a third-party consultant to assist with a five-year strategic management plan. Additionally, we've applied for and received a \$50,000 grant from the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED), thanks to Representative Dan Deasy and Senator Wayne Fontana. We've also been awarded a Local Government Academy (LGA) grant to hire a municipal intern, who will assist with the development of a Comprehensive Plan. This grant covers 66% of the intern's wages, leaving the Township responsible for just 34%, which amounts to approximately \$5.00 an hour.

We are also proud to announce that Scott Township has once again been awarded Banner Community status in 2024 by the Allegheny League of Municipalities. This designation reflects our commitment to sustainable practices, intergovernmental cooperation, sound fiscal management, and proactive communication with our community.

This issue of Scott Township News will highlight upcoming events, seasonal updates, and offer valuable information about recent legislation of interest to our residents. We hope this newsletter is both informative and helpful.

My office helped more than 1,700 people receive a rebate through the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program last year. This state program supports older Pennsylvanians, widows, widowers, and individuals with disabilities in recovering part of their property taxes or rent. For 2025, the income limit has increased to \$46,520, making more residents eligible for rebates ranging from \$380 to \$1,000, based on income and payments.

A Message from the Chief of Police – Stay Safe, Stay Informed

Dear Scott Township Residents,

As your Chief of Police, I am committed to keeping our community safe, informed, and prepared for the challenges that arise. In this year's newsletter, I would like to address a few critical topics that can help ensure your safety and that of your neighbors. We'll discuss some of the common scams currently targeting residents, provide a quick reminder about reporting traffic concerns, and introduce an exciting new feature to keep you connected with our department for key updates.

Beware of Common Scams

Scammers are constantly looking for new ways to take advantage of unsuspecting residents. As a community, it's important to stay alert and protect yourself. Below are some of the most common scams in the area:

1. Impersonation Scams: Scammers may call, email, or even visit your home pretending to be someone from a trusted organization, such as the IRS, utility companies, or law enforcement. They often threaten arrest, fines, or service disconnections to pressure you into handing over money or personal information.

Tip: If someone claims to be from an organization, ask for their name, phone number, and any other identifying information. Then, independently verify their identity by calling the organization directly using the contact information from their official website.

2. Online Shopping Scams: With online shopping on the rise, so too is the number of fraudulent sellers. Scammers create fake websites or social media ads that offer great deals on items that never arrive or are counterfeit.

Tip: Always do research before making an online purchase, especially from unfamiliar sellers. Check reviews, verify contact information, and use secure payment methods such as credit cards, which often offer fraud protection.

3. Romance Scams: These scams typically begin with an online relationship that develops over time. The scammer, often from another country, eventually asks for money under various pretenses—such as a medical emergency, travel costs, or a financial hardship.

Tip: Be cautious of anyone asking for money early in an online relationship. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is.

If you believe you've been the victim of a scam, or if you encounter suspicious activity, please report it immediately to the Scott Township Police Department. We are here to help and investigate.

Reporting Traffic Concerns

We rely on the vigilance of our residents to help us maintain a safe driving environment in Scott Township. If you notice unsafe driving behaviors, such as speeding, running stop signs, or other dangerous practices, we encourage you to report these concerns through our Police Department website. Simply visit <https://scott-twp.com/departments/scott-township-police-department/> and submit a report with details about the location, time, and type of violation. Your reports play a vital role in ensuring the safety of our streets.

New Reporting Features for Your Convenience

We are excited to introduce a new, user-friendly tool for our residents: Frontline Public Safety Solutions. Through this platform, you can now easily report a variety of situations directly to the police department. Here's how it can help you:

• **Overnight Parking:** If you need to park your vehicle overnight on the street, simply report it to us through this new system to avoid any potential parking violations.

• **Vacation Checks:** Going out of town? Let us know when you'll be away, and we can perform extra patrols around your home for added security.

• **At-Risk Residents:** If you have a loved one who may be at risk due to age, illness, or other factors, you can provide us with helpful information to ensure they receive the attention they need.

• **Keyholder Information:** Businesses and residents can provide information stored in a secure manner for purposes of investigating alarms or other issues. If you utilize this feature, please indicate if you have cameras on premises as this could help in the investigation of crimes in your neighborhood.

CODE ENFORCEMENT IS VITAL TO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Did you know that Scott Township administers and enforces Pennsylvania's statewide building code, generally known as the Uniform Construction Code (UCC)? Enforcement of the UCC actually began in April 2004. As of Feb. 14, 2022 the applicable codes are the 2018 International Codes issued by the International Code Council, and the provisions amended by the UCC Review & Advisory Council.

So, what does this mean to you as a home owner wanting to make improvements to your property?????

Building permits are required for all improvements regulated by the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code. Zoning Permits are required for all work regulated by the Scott Township Zoning Ordinance.



Spring cleaning is right around the corner; please keep in mind that it is unlawful to have unsightly debris or junk in your yard or around your property. It is also illegal to have an unregistered or uninspected vehicle(s) on your property. Regularly sweep sidewalk to ensure the safety of pedestrians.

Construction bags or dumpsters can be placed on your property for clean up or a construction project for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. PODS are a convenient way to pack your belongings for storage elsewhere. PODS are also permitted to remain on your property for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. You **cannot** use trailers for storage on your property. Bags, Dumpsters, or PODS are not permitted in any roadway area.



Rental Property Inspections

Under PA Act 21, effective June 1, 2015 owners of all rental properties will be required to install carbon monoxide detectors and obtain a rental inspection. Rental life safety inspections are required prior to

a new tenant moving in and an annual Certification is required for all rental property in the Township which includes a fee of \$25.00 per dwelling unit.

WORK THAT REQUIRES A ZONING PERMIT, BUT NO BUILDING PERMIT

- One-story detached accessory structures used as tool and storage sheds, greenhouses, playhouse, detached private garage and similar uses, provided the floor area does not exceed 1000 square feet and they are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Retaining walls 4'-0" or less in height, measured from the lowest level of grade to the top of the wall, unless supporting a surcharge (such as, but not limited to, a slope, driveway, patio or swimming pool) or impounding Class I, II or IIIA liquids.
- Sidewalks, parking pads, patios, and driveways not more than 30 inches above adjacent grade, and not over any basement or story below grade and not part of an accessible route.
- Fences 6 feet or less in height.
- Uncovered decks where the deck floor is 30 inches or less above grade and are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Carports (open on at least three sides and not attached to the dwelling)

Building permits **MUST** be obtained **30 days** prior to the project start date and a completed Scott Township Verification of Tax Payments form **MUST** also be included in the application. Applications are available on the Scott Township website under the Code Enforcement tab. All submittals are required to include the application/building permit fee. Incomplete submittals will not be processed.

WORK THAT DOES NOT REQUIRE A PERMIT

- Window awnings that are attached to a single-family dwelling, two-family dwelling, or Group U occupancy structure, are supported by an exterior wall, and do not project more than 54 inches from the exterior wall.
- Movable cases, counters and partitions that are not over 5 feet 9 inches in height.
- Painting, papering, tiling, carpeting, cabinets, counter-tops and similar finish work.
- Window and door replacement that does not require structural modifications to the wall or framing.
- Prefabricated swimming pools accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling that are less than 24" deep, do not exceed 5,000 gallons and are installed entirely above grade.
- Installation of aluminum or vinyl siding onto an existing residential or an existing commercial building.
- Alterations and repairs to residential buildings which do not make structural changes or changes to means of egress.

Please note that the Allegheny County Health Department's Plumbing Division inspects and permits all new or modified residential and commercial plumbing installations to assure compliance with the Health Department's Plumbing Code. Scott Township requires proof of inspection and compliance prior to issuing any Occupancy Permits for all projects that require plumbing permits.

Garbage Collection Reminder

Please be reminded that garbage containers may be placed at the curb side no earlier than **5:00 PM ON SUNDAY EVENING** and must be removed no later than **9:00 PM ON MONDAY EVENING**. Garbage containers shall be stored in the rear of the property within five (5) feet of the primary structure or garage or an accessory structure, including a shed, to be out of sight when viewed from the front of the lot or street. Garbage containers may be stored in the front of the home. In such cases, garbage containers shall be concealed from view from the front of the lot or street with shrubs, trees or by other appropriate measures approved by the township zoning ordinance.

Parking Pads & Driveways

All parking pads and driveways must have a valid permit and must be constructed using either concrete, asphalt, or an approved hard surface. Scott Township does not permit gravel parking pads, gravel driveways, parking pads parallel with the roadway, **OR PARKING IN THE LAWN AREA.**

PEST ALERTS

Outdoor Recommendations:

- Avoid having a bird feeder.
- Keep outdoor grills and cooking areas clean.
- Keep firewood off the ground and as far away from structures as possible.
- Maintain at least a 2-foot space between bushes and shrubs.
- Clean up after your dog daily.
- Avoid keeping compost mounds or debris piles.

Indoor Recommendations:

- Opt for garbage bins and compost containers with a top that seals tightly.
- Do not leave pet food or water out overnight.
- Repair leaky pipes.
- Maintain attic, crawl spaces, and cabinets.

BOWER HILL VFD BECOME PART OF A TRADITION and COME JOIN THE DEPARTMENT

REMEMBER if you have a FIRE or MEDICAL EMERGENCY - PLEASE DIAL 9-1-1 Bower Hill is one of the 3 Fire Departments (Glendale and East Carnegie are the other departments serving Scott Township) that serve the over 17,000 Scott Township Residents and Businesses.

Bower Hill is a volunteer fire department with approximately 40 members who responded to over 300 calls in 2024 for assistance from the residents and businesses, regardless of the time of day. In addition to these responses members individually participated in approximately 36 hours of additional in-house training totaling over 1,400 hours with many taking additional outside training classes to better train us to help the residents and businesses of Scott Township and neighboring communities. We have also responded to requests for public service events including Public Safety Day and our annual open house in October.

Many of our members are part of firefighting families with some of them being 4th or 5th generation firefighters. Our members have gone on to make the fire service a career in many parts of the country such as Maryland, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Washington D. C., while others stay "closer to home" such as the City of Pittsburgh and Dormont. If you or a family member might be interested in joining us, stop by on any 2nd thru 4th Wednesday of each month to see what we do during training. When you become a member we send you to fire service training.

Not interested in "Fighting Fires" we have several categories of members these are:

REGULAR - anyone 18 and over interested in firefighting or fire ground support services.

JUNIOR - (AGES 14-17) interested in firefighting (Some can get this training in high school programs)

FRIEND - Not into firefighting but still want to help, this is the category for you. You can help with fund raising and public service events.

FIREVEST is a program offering firefighters an opportunity to attend CCAC to pursue a degree, not necessarily in the fire Service. The commitment of 5 years to the fire department (including your time attending CCAC) sponsoring you is required. Programs such as Arson Investigation, HVAC, Auto Mechanic and many other courses are available. Some of the FIREVEST graduates have gone on to get a Bachelor's degrees at 4 year colleges and universities including Arsen Investigation.

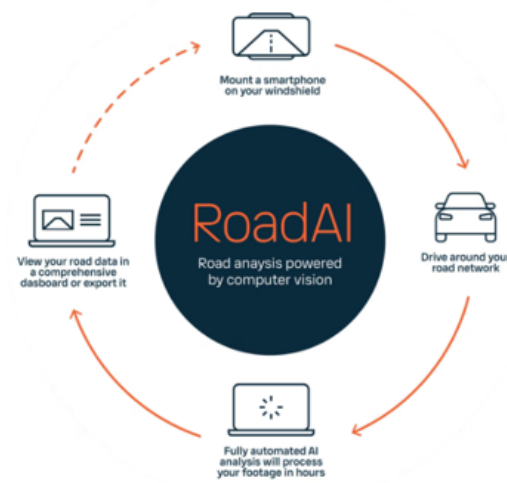
Conditions of the Roads During the Winter Months.

During the winter months when the temperatures fall and stay below 20 F, we receive calls and emails about the conditions of the roads throughout the Township. “The roads are terrible. They are falling apart. What is happening to our road?” The simple answer is the winter Freeze and Thaw Cycle. When temperatures are above freezing, rainwater or snowmelt will make its way into any small crack in the pavement. Then, as temperatures drop below freezing, the water within the cracked pavement begins to freeze and expand, causing the crack to expand and grow. Water expands when it freezes and causes the asphalt to split. Freezing water also causes the ground to heave or uplift due to the expansion. Water freezing below the pavement can sometimes cause a frost heave to occur. Although not all soils are susceptible, frost heave occurs when water is allowed to freeze and expand in large chunks, called “ice lenses.” The material above these ice lenses is heaved upward with great force, deforming the pavement.

The winter freeze and thaw cycle is a “hard” time for asphalt pavements, literally. Asphalt pavements are produced and constructed at high temperatures when the asphalt binder is a liquid so it can be easily mixed with the rocks and sand. During the spring, summer, and fall seasons, asphalt is flexible and stretchy in the warm weather, helping to prevent cracks from forming. However, as temperatures decrease during winter, the asphalt becomes harder and stronger but also more brittle. Because of this, winter is a difficult time to install asphalt and a difficult time for existing asphalt. Extreme cold temperatures can cause pavements to crack, but the most damage to pavements is caused by freeze-thaw cycles.

During the winter months public works crews remove the broken asphalt and other debris from along the roads and on the catch basins grates. This allows melting water to enter the stormwater collection and conveyance system before it can freeze on the road. Potholes are filled with cold patch asphalt and will be treated again in the spring when hot asphalt is available from the local asphalt plants. The areas of cracking are inventoried and will be programmed into our annual patching and crack-sealing programs. As the temperatures continue to rise the ice underneath the road surface will melt and the road heaving condition will subside. We monitor the conditions along the roads and make appropriate repairs. The new AI application recently approved by the Township will help us monitor the cracking conditions. Our crack sealing efforts will help to keep water from entering the roads at curb and centerline locations. Going forward consideration should be given to including additional stormwater collection and conveyance along Township streets. Collecting the water before it gets under the road surface will help prevent the conditions that we observe during the winter months.

Road AI Overview



To aid with the evaluation of the conditions of Township roads the Board of Commissioners approved the implementation of an Artificial Intelligence (AI) based system for collecting data on the condition of roadway pavement in the Township. The Township owns and maintains thirty-nine miles of residential and collector roads. At the beginning of each year our Public Works Department prepares a list of the roads in greatest need of resurfacing. The Public Works employees are familiar with the Township roads and their recommendations are based on the visual condition of the road segments. Attention is given to surface delamination, block, transverse and alligator cracking, failing utility patches and severe rutting. The current process is subjective and time consuming and isn't based on a data driven evaluation.

The roadway infrastructure is susceptible to structural degradation on account of material deterioration primarily caused by heavy traffic, harsh weather conditions, and aging. The success of a road transport system is inherently dependent on the riding quality and comfort level of the commuters, for which timely detection of faults and ensuing repairs is of utmost importance. The manual observation and

detection methods are cumbersome and time-consuming. involving high costs. Over the past decade machine learning and Artificial Intelligence applications have been developed and are being used

Road AI is an application that runs on a smartphone. It is fitted onto a vehicle (any car or truck in our fleet) to collect HD video. Once the phone is in place we drive the vehicle around all our roads to collect footage of the road conditions and other assets, like signs. The footage is then automatically uploaded on the RoadAI servers and then processed with computer vision technology. It identifies the pavement conditions using the same methodology that engineers use to assess the conditions of road. The AI application generates reports identifying the sections of the road in need of replacement. Conditions are ranked as the most severe to those in good conditions. Below is a graphic displaying the process.

Stormwater Pollution Solutions

Residential



Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.

Lawn care

Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.



- ◆ Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- ◆ Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- ◆ Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- ◆ Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.

Septic systems

Leaking and poorly maintained septic systems release nutrients and pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that can be picked up by stormwater and discharged into nearby waterbodies. Pathogens can cause public health problems and environmental concerns.



- ◆ Inspect your system every 3 years and pump your tank as necessary (every 3 to 5 years).
- ◆ Don't dispose of household hazardous waste in sinks or toilets.

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody.



- ◆ Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- ◆ Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet waste

Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters.



- ◆ When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies.



Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers near storm drains warn residents that pollutants entering the drains will be carried untreated into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement—Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through, decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels—You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquito-proof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.



Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales—Specially designed areas planted with native plants can provide natural places for



rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather than into storm drains.

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets.



Commercial

Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system and eventually enter local waterbodies.

- ◆ Sweep up litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- ◆ Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.
- ◆ Report any chemical spill to the local hazardous waste cleanup team. They'll know the best way to keep spills from harming the environment.

Erosion controls that aren't maintained can cause excessive amounts of sediment and debris to be carried into the stormwater system. Construction vehicles can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater and deposited into local waterbodies.

- ◆ Divert stormwater away from disturbed or exposed areas of the construction site.
- ◆ Install silt fences, vehicle mud removal areas, vegetative cover, and other sediment and erosion controls and properly maintain them, especially after rainstorms.
- ◆ Prevent soil erosion by minimizing disturbed areas during construction projects, and seed and mulch bare areas as soon as possible.



Construction



Agriculture

Lack of vegetation on streambanks can lead to erosion. Overgrazed pastures can also contribute excessive amounts of sediment to local waterbodies. Excess fertilizers and pesticides can poison aquatic animals and lead to destructive algae blooms. Livestock in streams can contaminate waterways with bacteria, making them unsafe for human contact.



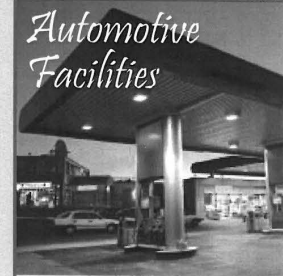
- ◆ Keep livestock away from streambanks and provide them a water source away from waterbodies.
- ◆ Store and apply manure away from waterbodies and in accordance with a nutrient management plan.
- ◆ Vegetate riparian areas along waterways.
- ◆ Rotate animal grazing to prevent soil erosion in fields.
- ◆ Apply fertilizers and pesticides according to label instructions to save money and minimize pollution.



Forestry

Improperly managed logging operations can result in erosion and sedimentation.

- ◆ Conduct preharvest planning to prevent erosion and lower costs.
- ◆ Use logging methods and equipment that minimize soil disturbance.
- ◆ Plan and design skid trails, yard areas, and truck access roads to minimize stream crossings and avoid disturbing the forest floor.
- ◆ Construct stream crossings so that they minimize erosion and physical changes to streams.
- ◆ Expedite revegetation of cleared areas.



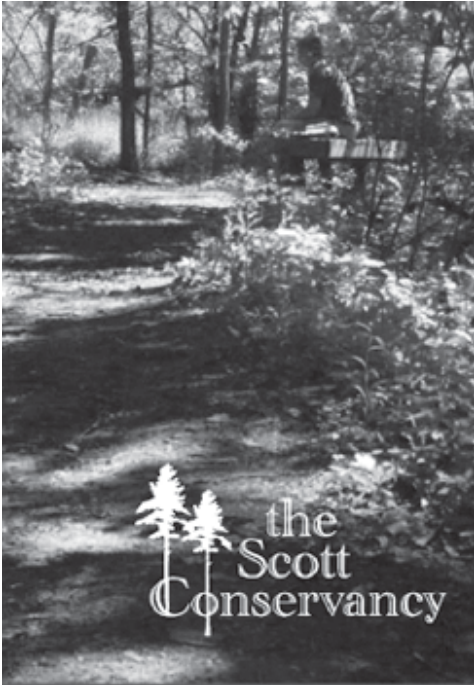
Automotive Facilities

Uncovered fueling stations allow spills to be washed into storm drains. Cars waiting to be repaired can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater.

- ◆ Clean up spills immediately and properly dispose of cleanup materials.
- ◆ Provide cover over fueling stations and design or retrofit facilities for spill containment.
- ◆ Properly maintain fleet vehicles to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into local waterbodies.
- ◆ Install and maintain oil/water separators.

The Scott Conservancy

Offering Woodland Trails and Lovely Natural Venues—Close to Home!

Nestled in the hills of Scott Township is a wonderful, woody escape from the bustle of suburban life. Kane Woods Nature Area on Scrubgrass Road offers a series of intersecting trails in varying levels of difficulty. Relatively level paths crisscross small creeks and pass through scenic forests, while more challenging, steeper paths traverse hillsides. If you choose to visit, you'll likely spy birds and wildlife, native plants and trees, and neighborhood folks enjoying the outdoors—often with a dog! Nearly 80 acres of nature preserve are available to enjoy; Scott Conservancy members and volunteers maintain the entire property, keeping it attractive and accessible.

Three parking lots are available for visitors: An upper, large lot can be reached via the Whiskey Point Trailhead located at 1501 Main Street, where Main meets Scrubgrass Road, near the Veteran's Memorial Bridge. The most popular parking lot is the Scrubgrass Run Trailhead at 1459 Scrubgrass Road; another option is the Jewish Community Center parking lot on Kane Blvd. All three areas provide access to the trail network.

Since Scott Conservancy is managed entirely by volunteers, there is no paid staff; all fundraising is done by members in true grassroots fashion. Money raised by donations is invested back into the properties to improve the nature area and keep trails clear and safe. We maintain an apiary near Providence Point, and sell our local, raw honey as a fundraiser. Additionally, we hold an Annual Ducky Race 50/50 Raffle at Scott Pool on Independence Day, July 4, as our biggest fundraiser of the year. Most recently, we've begun a joint venture with the Scott Township municipal crew: the collection of your Christmas trees! Fresh-cut trees that are dropped off at the Conservancy's Scrubgrass Run trailhead on Scrubgrass Road are then ground into wood chips and spread on our trails, making Kane Woods a more pleasant place to walk all year.

For more than 35 years, the Scott Conservancy has been supported by mostly local residents who love Scott Township and its undeveloped natural areas. In addition to Kane Woods, the Conservancy also maintains part of the traffic island at the intersection of Cochran and Greentree Roads. Scott Conservancy

members give their time and efforts in both locations, simply for the benefit of our community. But it's not all work for members and volunteers—we have fun events, like potluck picnics, bonfires, birdwatching hikes, and more! Members receive emails about upcoming events as well as quarterly newsletters with local interest stories, and can help to sell honey at local special occasions such as Scott Township Octoberfest, Bridgeville Days, and Mt. Lebanon's Earth Day.

We invite you to come see our trails and nature area, and hope you will consider volunteering with the Scott Conservancy or supporting us financially through donations or membership. 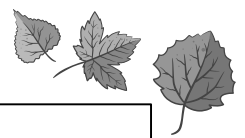

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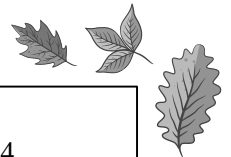

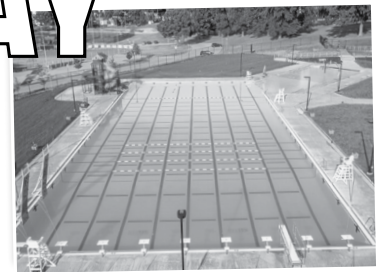
